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# **Bunche Center Commentary**

This month we're pleased to welcome Professor Mark Sawyer as our guest commentator. Dr. Sawyer is currently a Professor of African American Studies and Political Science at UCLA, Director of the Center for the Study of Race, Ethnicity and Politics, and Chair of the Interdepartmental Program in Afro-American Studies. In fall of 2005, he was a Visiting Associate Professor at the Department of African and African-American Studies at Harvard University. He is author of Racial Politics in Post Revolutionary Cuba, which was recently published by Cambridge University press and received the Du Bois Award for the best book by the National Conference of Black Political Scientists and the Ralph Bunche Award from the American Political Science Association. He has published widely in the areas of race, immigration and citizenship around the globe. In this issue, he updates us on the Afro-American Studies degree program.

#### IDP: A Look Ahead

It has been a momentous year for the Interdisciplinary Program (IDP) in Afro-American Studies. Last fall we were saddened by the passing of E. Victor Wolfenstein, who had been a stalwart of our program for many years. Victor fell ill only a few days before he affirmed his support for the IDP by agreeing to co-chair. We will miss Victor, but his influence lives on.

We have welcomed new faculty members associated with the Bunche Center. Sarah Haley and Uri MacMillan joined us and teach classes for Afro-American Studies as well as Women's Studies and English respectively. We are excited about their work and students have greeted their contributions with open arms. Our colleague, Mignon Moore, was promoted to Associate Professor with tenure, and her book, Invisible Families: Gay Identities, Relationships and Motherhood Among Black Women (University of California Press) was well received. We are excited to have Professor Moore contributing to the IDP.

In the summer of 2011, Afro-American Studies launched its first summer travel study program. In July of 2011, Professor Cesar J. Ayala of Sociology and I took 50 students from the University of California system to San Juan, Puerto Rico. While in Puerto Rico, students studied the Black Experience in Latin America as well as the Sociology of the

Caribbean. Students learned about the unique racial history of Puerto Rico and surrounding islands. We also visited places with unique racial history tied to plantation agriculture the City of Ponce and the Island of Vieques. The program has been renewed for another year and we are currently signing up students to travel to Puerto Rico in July 2012. (See more about Professor Sawyer's study trip on page 10.)

The biggest news is that we have moved to complete an initiative begun by our previous chair, Professor Brenda Stevenson. In October of 2012, the faculty voted to approve submitting a proposal for the IDP in Afro-American Studies to become the Department of African American Studies. We have submitted our proposal to the academic Senate and are looking forward to meeting with them in the Spring to discuss it. We are optimistic about the proposal but are mindful of the difficult budgetary situation for the Division of Social Sciences and the broader University. We have appreciated the support of the faculty of the IDP and the Faculty Advisory committee, the faculty and staff of the Bunche Center, and our staff member, Lisbeth Gant-Britton. If we are successful in departmentalization, it will have been a group effort. A Department of African American Studies at UCLA is long overdue. We hope our status will be changed by Fall of 2013.

The IDP in Afro-American Studies is in a period of exciting transition. We thank you for your support.



#### New Vice Provost M. Belinda Tucker

The Bunche Center congratulates M. Belinda Tucker on her appointment to the newly established position of vice provost of the Institute of American Cultures.

Dr. Tucker is a professor of psychiatry and biobehavioral sciences, and is a Bunche Center Affiliated Faculty member. She received her B.A. from the University of Chicago and a Ph.D. in social psychology from the University of Michigan.

Under Dr. Tucker's leadership, the IAC will serve as the administrative hub for UCLA's four ethnic studies centers and will initiate campus-wide research, educational programs and collaborations that support a wide range of disciplinary approaches to the study of American cultures.

Black History Month Documentaries (PBS) February 2, 9, 16, check local stations for times



The celebration of Black History Month on PBS' "Independent Lens" will include several films in observance of African American history, including "More Than A Month," a documentary which follows filmmaker Shukree Hassan Tilghman's cross-country campaign to end Black History Month, challenging the commemoration as short-changing black history and culture; "Daisy Bates: First Lady of Little Rock," which focuses on civil rights activist Daisy Bates, who fought for the right of nine black students to attend the all-white Central High School of Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1957; and "The Black Power Mixtape 1967-1975," a film is by seven Swedish journalists who came to America in the late 1960s and early 1970s to document the burgeoning black power movement and contains unseen footage of interviews with leading black power figures such as Angela Davis, Stokely Carmichael and Eldridge Cleaver.

UCLA Institute of American Cultures The Institute of American Cultures, in conjunction with the American Indian Studies
Center, the Asian American Studies Center, Bunche Center for African American
Studies, and the Chicano Studies Research Center, invites applications for support of research on African Americans,
American Indians, Asian Americans, and Chicanas/os for 2012-2013. The Institute also invites proposals on interethnic
relations that will increase collaboration between the Centers and/or between the Centers and other campus units.
UCLA faculty, staff, graduate students, and IAC postdoctoral fellows are all eligible to apply.

The Research Grant Program is on a reimbursement basis only. Ordinarily, faculty projects will be funded for no more than \$10,000 and graduate student projects for no more than \$7,000. Funds for the purchase of permanent equipment will be provided only under exceptional circumstances. Conference travel, whether the applicant is presenting or attending, is ineligible.

Applications are available now and must be received no later than 5:00 p.m., April 20, 2012. Awards will be announced by the third week in June. **Scot Brown**, Professor of History and African American Studies at UCLA and a Bunche Center Affiliated Faculty Member, **served as a music historian and commentator on the popular TV ONE television documentary series**, *Unsung*. The episodes featured two bands with Dayton roots: The Ohio Players and Heatwave; the Canton/Cleveland, Ohio-based vocal group, the O'Jays; and The Spinners, originating from Detroit. Brown is steadfastly working on a book about the untold story of African American music in Dayton, Ohio.



**Sondra Hale**, Professor Emeritus of Anthropology and Bunche Affiliated Faculty Member **received a "Life-Time Scholarly Achievement" award** from the Association of Middle East Women's Studies. Richard Yarborough is a Professor of English at UCLA and a Bunche Center Affiliate Faculty Member. Dr. Yarborough also served as director of the Center for six years. His essay, "Academic Leadership, Community, and Values in a Time of Crisis," appeared in the Modern Language Association Journal, Profession 2011. In April of last year, Dr. Yarborough also had an essay on the writer William Attaway published in the book, Writers of the Black Chicago Renaissance, edited by Steven C. Tracy (Univ. of Chicago Press, 2011). In October 2011, Yarborough was a guest speaker at a session entitled "Navigating the Economic Strain" at the Conference of Ford Foundation Fellows in Irvine, California and in December, he served on a panel entitled "Origins" at the conference, "African American Studies: Past, Present, and Future," convened at Yale University.

# Interdepartmental Program Afro-American Studies



Professor Mark Sawyer, IDP Chair and Bunche Center Affiliated Faculty Member, will lead a new Summer Travel Course (Afro-Am/Soc M154D) to Puerto Rico, July 1<sup>st</sup> – July 28<sup>th</sup>, Session A, Summer 2012. The trip will allow students to experience the unique geographic and political location of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, which offers a unique combination of geographic, cultural, and political conditions that place it both "inside" and "outside" the United States. Study issues of political and economic development in Latin America and the Caribbean, as well as issues of race and ethnicity that are of "domestic" U.S. concern. Even if students have taken M154C already,

#### Research



On February 13<sup>th</sup>, opening arguments will be made to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco over the constitutionality of Prop 209. On March 7<sup>th</sup>, the Six Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati will conduct a peer review of the identical ban on race-conscious admission in Michigan to determine if it is illegal and if affirmative action should be restored.

In the December 2011/January 2012 Bunche Center Newsletter, we discussed the Amicus Brief written by the Bunche Center. It is work done as part of a larger coalition of educators, activists, and students who have joined forces to file legal cases in the Sixth and Ninth Circuit Courts of Appeals that challenge the bans on affirmative action in Michigan and California.

As the Ninth and Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals prepare to hear oral arguments within the next two months, various student groups on the UCLA campus will host events on the pros and cons of California Proposition 209 and affirmative action. The first event will take place on February 9, 2012, from 7:00pm to 9:00pm in Moore Hall, room 100. The event is free and open to the public.
