

Clyde Woods passes away at age 54

It is with great sadness that the Bunche Center announces the passing of **Clyde Woods, an associate professor at the University of California, Santa Barbara**. Woods began teaching at UCSB in 2005 and also served as acting director of the Center for Black Studies Research.

Woods was a distinguished scholar whose research examined social and public policy

issues by studying the cultural practices of those oppressed by them. Professor Woods died on July 6, 2011, at Cottage Hospital in Santa Barbara.

"Clyde Woods was an admired colleague, professor, and student mentor, and he will be deeply missed by all the members of our UCSB family," said Chancellor Henry T. Yang.

Woods was the author of the recently published book "In the Wake of Hurricane Katrina: New Paradigms and Social Visions" (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2010), as well as two other books, "Development Arrested - Race, Power and the Blues in the Mississippi Delta" (Verso, 1998); and "Development Drowned and Reborn," a study of post-Katrina New Orleans that is currently under review by the University of California Press.

Woods served as a panelist for the Bunche Center's 2010 Black Los Angeles Symposium and was a valued friend and colleague to many at the Center.

Woods received his Ph.D. in urban and regional planning from UCLA, and joined the UCSB faculty following appointments at Pennsylvania State University and the University of Maryland. He is survived by his son, Malik Woods.

Champion of diversity widens pathway to opportunity

When the enrollment of African American students at UCLA decreased to 100 students in 2006. Darnell Hunt. director of the Ralph J. Bunche Center for African American Studies, knew he had his work cut out for him. Hunt provided community members with research the center had been conducting on the declining number of blacks being admitted to the nation's most prestigious universities, including UCLA, and recommendations about what could be done to increase the numbers. He served as a consultant to the Alliance for Equal Opportunity in Education, a community group that was formed to increase the number of blacks applying to and enrolling at UCLA. And Hunt then worked with campus officials on what all agreed was an admissions crisis. Three years later, he headed the university's Committee for Undergraduate Admissions and Relations with Schools that sets policies for admission to UCLA. For those efforts and many others, Hunt, a sociology professor who this year marks 10 years as the Bunche Center's director, was awarded this year's Academic Senate's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Award.

2011 SHI Cohort

In August, the Bunche Center's Summer Humanities Institute (SHI) concluded the 11th year of the program, which prepares traditionally underrepresented students from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and others with a commitment to advancing scholarship in African American studies, to successfully complete a graduate pro-

gram in the humanities and humanistic social sciences.

SHI, which is funded through a generous grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, is conducted under the umbrella of the UCLA Summer Program in Undergraduate Research (SPUR). It is an eight-week program open to upper-division undergraduates which prepares students to pursue graduate studies and enter academic careers in the humanities and humanistic social sciences;

grounds students in the essential competencies of multidisciplinary scholarship and enhances their understanding of interdisciplinary approaches; introduces students to the rigors, opportunities, and prerequisites for a successful academic career; facilitates faculty and peer mentoring; and exposes students to cultural sites in the Los Angeles black community.

To achieve these program goals, SHI provides instructional offerings that include seminars, skills development workshops, cultural activities, and mentoring by leading faculty at UCLA. SHI covers travel expenses, housing, and pays each participant a modest stipend.

Students from previous cohorts continue to make excellent progress in graduate programs at Yale, Brown, Cornell, Auburn, Harvard, Penn State, Duke, and UCLA. Some have been awarded the prestigious Fulbright Scholarship.

This year, ten students were selected from a highly competitive pool of applicants. The 2011 cohort hailed from nine different colleges and universities including: Claflin University, Lane College, Bennett College, Spelman College, Lincoln University, Grinnell College, Cheyney University, Tennessee State University and Hampton University.

Participating in this year's program, **Isaiah Iboko**, a senior at Grinnell College where he studies intersections of race, gender, and class, spoke about his SHI experience.

Ed.: Why did you apply to SHI?

II: At my school, we don't have an African American Studies concentration or major, so I can't fully explore that because my professors don't have that background. I really wanted to have a summer to get immersed in the field of African American studies with professors that can guide me.

Ed.: What do you consider the strongest part of the SHI program and why?

II: Having seminars and other programs. They've taught me to balance time between seminar, classes, research, and learning about grad programs and funding sources. I feel so much better

equipped. By working with a large number of professors from different disciplines, I really gained the ability to be prepared for grad school.

The seminars were also really eye-opening for me. At my school, I am not often given the opportunity to look exclusively at texts written by African American authors. Here, I'm able to look at them every day and apply theories that I've learned, such as intersectionality.

Ed.: What skills has the program helped you with?

II: Program helped me develop my writing skills. I have had the opportunity to look at what I'm really interested in and with that topic, develop a single paper from start to finish over an 8-week period under the scrutiny of a mentor who is holding me to the standards of grad school. Before, I felt like I was just cranking out papers. Here, the standards are higher. I think it's one of the strongest parts of the program – that there are people who really care about teaching you how to craft this one piece of work.

Ed.: Did you gain anything from working with the mentors and being in a cohort?

II: The cohort is amazing. It is a totally different perspective than the one I get at Grinnell. Their comments in the seminars have been very insightful. Outside of the seminars, I feel like I am grateful to have come into contact with all of them. They are all smart people. It is nice to be around those who look like me with the same goals of wanting to get a Ph.D. It makes me feel like it is more of an attainable goal. SHI has been an amazing experience.
