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Bunche Center Commentary

This month, Bunche Center director Darnell Hunt introduces the Center's newest research initiative, Race and Hollywood. Dr. Hunt has written extensively on race and media. Over the past twenty years, he has worked on numerous projects exploring the issues of access and diversity in the entertainment industry, including work with the WGA, SAG, AFTRA, and NAACP. Dr. Hunt edited *Channeling Blackness: Studies on Television and Race in America*, (Oxford University Press, 2005), an anthology of classic and contemporary studies examining television access and representations. He also served as a media researcher for the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights' 1993 hearings on diversity in Hollywood and has been a frequent public commentator on questions of media and race in national and international media.

In 1991-1992, John Densmore (former drummer for the musical group The Doors), established an endowment fund to support UCLA undergraduate majors or minors in Afro-American Studies who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement. Scholar, musician, and athlete, Jordon Norris was the Desnmore Scholarship award winner for the 2011-12 academic year. After the recent awards luncheon on April 10th, we had an opportunity to discuss with Jordon the impact of the Densmore scholarship and how he hopes to combine his academic research interests with his passion for music.

Ed. Tell us about yourself.

J.N. I'm from Oakland, California, and I transferred to UCLA after attending two years at Lanev.

College. I played football there and was going to pursue a football scholarship at a 4-year university when I realized I wanted to focus more on my academic career. I came to UCLA as a philosophy major and changed my major to African American studies after my first quarter.

Ed. What is your research interest?

J.N. I am interested in the K-12 education pipeline, the track to incarceration, and the commonalities between the two. I want to look at how the education system contributes to some people of color ending up on the incarceration track.

Ed. How have the scholarship funds helped you with your education?

J.N. The \$5,000 scholarship has helped a lot. I was trying to figure out ways to make sure I had my college career paid for so I wouldn't have lots of debt. I have been working as a resident assistant and was doing other things on the side to cover the cost of living, campus fees. The scholarship helps me so I don't have to work as much at my other job, which is working at a retail store at the West Side Pavilion. I don't have to work there as much and can really focus on my studies.

Ed. One of the things highlighted at the luncheon was your music video. Tell us about your interest in music.

J.N. I was writing poetry at first, from young age. My brother, who was a student at UCLA at the time, encouraged me to experiment with my poetry. I was hanging out with some friends one night, playing around with the words, and it sort of evolved into rapping.

My plan is to make music a profession. I'm focusing on taking the steps to make that possible. I'm dedicating my time to my education, but the music video and other things I'm doing with my music, those are the building blocks. I am building up a following, networking, capitalizing on all the musical resources and contacts I have.

Ed. Were you aware of John Densmore and his music before you applied for the scholarship?

J.N. I was vaguely aware of him...my father, he is a big fan of The Doors. But I didn't know about Densmore to any great degree. When I got this scholarship and I was able to meet Densmore, my father was very excited. Densmore, anyone involved in music, has common understanding. He's a great person and a great resource.

Ed. Why did you transfer to UCLA?

M.R. I'm from San Francisco and I transferred here from Foothill College in Los Altos, California. I was in the honors program there and wanted to study African American studies, but they didn't really have that at my school. They only had one English class that focused on African American writers. I came to UCLA for a Student Transfer Opportunity Mentorship Program (STOMP) conference and fell in love with the campus. Once I came to STOMP, I saw myself as a Bruin and wanted to be a part of it.

Ed. How have the funds from the scholarship helped you over the last year?

M.R. The scholarship paid for books, a computer, and it made it so I didn't have to take out as much in student loans. I'm very appreciative of the scholarship.

Ed. What influenced you to major in African American studies?

M.R. My research interest is in the mass incarceration of African American males. I grew up in an environment where African American males don't survive very long. They are men who are capable of doing a lot of things, but they don't have the opportunities so instead, they get in trouble and end up incarcerated.

Ed. How do you intend to use your degree? What are your future plans?

M.R. I want to become an attorney, doing criminal law. I want the law to be an even playing ground for everyone. The justice system (as it is now) is just not fair.



On May 8th, author and sociologist Averil Y. Clarke discusses her book, *Inequalities of Love*, as part of the **Bunche Authors Series**. Clarke's book uses the personal narratives of college-educated black women to describe the difficulties they face when trying to date, marry, and have children. The author analyzes the accounts of black women who repeatedly return to incompatible partners as they lose hope of finding "Mr. Right" and reject unwed parenting because it seems to affirm a negative stereotype of black women's sexuality that is inconsistent with their personal and professional identities.

This talk takes place from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. in Haines Hall 135 and is co-sponsored with the UCLA Center for the Study of Women; the UCLA Office of the Vice Provost for Diversity and Faculty Development; the UCLA Center for the Study of Race, Ethnicity and Politics; the Critical Race Studies Program in the UCLA School of Law and Dr. M. Belinda Tucker in the UCLA Center for Culture & Health.

On Wednesday, May 9, 2012 at noon in Haines 135, UCLA history Professor Robert Hill will discuss "The Caribbean Garvey Movement: A New Perspective." Hill has been collecting documents related to Garvey since the early 1970s and his work is the basis for several important volumes documenting Garvey and the United Negro Improvement Association.

Faculty News





The Bunche Center and HBCUs

On April 12th and 13th, Dr. Lisbeth Gant-Britton, Student Affairs Officer of the Afro-American Studies Program, visited Tuskegee University to meet with students and faculty. Gant-Britton talked with students Ashea Turner, a senior, and Davonte Logan, a junior. Both students are interested in politics and public policy, and were chosen from a highly competitive, nationwide pool of HBCU students to participate in the **2012 Bunche Center Summer Humanities Institute** (SHI). Now in its 12th year, SHI provides rigorous academic training to high-potential undergraduate students from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and to others with a demonstrated commitment to advancing schol-

arship in African American studies to prepare them for successful graduate study in the humanities and humanistic social sciences.

Dr. Britton also met with Tuskegee's Provost, Dr. Luther S. Williams, faculty members Dr. Darryl Roberts, Pre-Law Advisor, Dr. Lisa Beth Hill, Chair, Department of History and Political Science, and Dr. Adaku Ankumah, Professor of English. In addition to working with students, the Bunche Center is eager to build a stronger relationship with HBCU faculty and looks forward to Dr. Ankumah visiting UCLA this summer. Dr. Ankumah will serve as the first Tuskegee faculty member to participate in what the Center hopes will be the start of an ongoing faculty exchange program.

Research

Appeals Court Upholds Prop. 209

In late 2011, the Center drafted an amicus brief which was used by a larger coalition of educators, activists, and students to file legal cases in the Sixth and Ninth Circuit Courts of Appeals that challenge the bans on affirmative action in Michigan and California. In a blow to

affirmative action in higher education, on April 2nd, a three judge panel of the Ninth Circuit Rejected the Challenge to Prop 209. The judges argued that little has changed since the court last ruled in favor of Proposition 209. The plaintiffs in the case plan to file a motion for en banc review by the entire court. College Students Invited to Submit Entries for

New Cosmic Frontiers International Science Essay Competition

The New Cosmic Frontiers International Science Essay Competition on the Nature of our Universe and its Habitats is open to college and high school students worldwide. The competition is designed to inspire students to consider careers in science, to nurture their enthusiasm for the subject, and to engage young minds in creative, intellectual activities essential to scientific endeavors. The first-prize winners will be awarded cash prizes of \$25,000 (for high school students) and \$50,000 (for college students). Winners also will be given an opportunity to meet world-renowned scientists and scholars at a conference and award ceremony, to be held in Philadelphia, October 12-13, 2012.

The college category is open to undergraduate students registered full-time at a college or university at the time of submission. Part-time college students are not eligible.
