Summer Humanities Institute

Funded through generous grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the University of California Office of the President, this month, the UCLA Bunche Center for African American Studies will host its thirteenth Summer Humanities Institute (SHI) from Sunday, June 23 to Saturday, August 17, 2013.

SHI caters to high-achieving students from historically under-represented groups in their junior and senior year, planning to pursue a doctoral degree in the humanities and social sciences, with a focus on the African American experience. The 2013 cohort hails from eight different schools, primarily historically black colleges and universities.

In May, the Bunche Circle of Thought Series and the Bunche Author Series held several public events with scholars from UCLA, UC Irvine, University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill, and Stanford University.

Karla Slocum, Associate Professor, Anthropology, University of North Carolina -Chapel Hill, discussed contemporary tour narratives of historical black towns. Later in the month, Sohail Daulatzai, Associate Professor, Department of Film and Media Studies and the Program in African American Studies at the University of California – Irvine, gave a talk, Fire in the Masters House: Malcolm X, Muslims and the Black Radical Imagination.

Continuing the series, Sharon Luk, a Postdoctoral Teaching Fellow from Stanford, presented her lecture, "Between Starshine and Clay': The Black Radical Tradition and Future Directions in Comparative Ethnic Studies," and Janira Teague gave the lecture, "I, too, Am America: Migrations, Identity and Citizenship in Black New York City, 1890s to 1930s." Teague is a UCLA Doctoral Candidate in history, and was the recipient of the UCLA Institute of American Cultures for the 2012-2013 academic year.

Finally, Jordan T. Camp, a Visiting Scholar at the Institute of American Cultures and the Bunche Center, ended the series with his discussion, "Interpreting the Housing Crisis in Los Angeles: Race, Class, and Dispossession." Camp is the co -editor of Freedom Now! Struggles for the Human Right to Housing in L.A. and Beyond (Freedom Now Books, 2012). To read about these scholars, Click Here.

Edmond J. Keller's two recent publications are "Meeting the Challenges of Strategic and Human Security Security Interests in US-Africa Relations, or the Orphaning of 'Soft Power'?," Africa Review 4, 1 (2013): 1-16, and "The Delivery of Public Goods in a Rapidly Expanding African City: Financing Policies in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia," Journal of International Affairs (2012).

Keller is Research Professor of political science, and former Director of the UCLA Globalization Research Center-Africa and of the James S. Coleman African Studies Center UCLA. He is also a Bunche Center affiliated faculty member. Keller specializes in comparative politics with an emphasis on Africa.





The UCLA Undergraduate Students Association Council dedicated a plaque in honor of the UCLA Freedom Riders on Tuesday, May 14, 2013 in Kerckhoff Hall. The event took place on the same day as the burning of a Freedom Rider's bus in Anniston, Alabama, which occurred on May 14, 1961.

The event featured a special presentation by Former Los Angeles City Councilmember Robert Farrell and Dr. Robert Singleton who discussed their experience as UCLA students who served as Freedom Riders. Dr. Singleton was the Bunche Center's Founding Director and served as the Bunche Center 2009-2010 IAC Visiting Scholar.

Dr. Singleton and his wife Helen joined the Freedom Rides and were arrested in Jackson, Mississippi, charged with "Breach of Peace," and subsequently incarcerated at Parchman Penitentiary with more than 300 other Freedom Riders. The Freedom Rides and the bus burning led to new regulations enforcing the Supreme Court's decisions and gradually led to society and policy change in America.
