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

Aisha Finch's Rethinking Slave Rebellion in Cuba Wins the Lapidus Center's First Annual Harriet Tubman Prize



Aisha Finch, Associate Professor of Gender Studies and Afro-American Studies at UCLA, was the winner of Lapidus Center's first annual Harriet Tubman Prize, which is awarded to the best nonfiction, U.S. published book about slave trade, slavery, and anti-slavery in the Atlantic World. She received the prize for *Rethinking Slave Rebellion in Cuba: La Escalera and the Insurgencies of 1841-1844*, published by The University of North Carolina Press.

Uri McMillan honored for his book on black feminist art and performance



On January 7, 2017, Uri McMillan, associate professor of English at UCLA and Bunche Center Faculty Associate, was awarded the William Sanders Scarborough Prize for his book, *Embodied Avatars: Genealogies of Black Feminist Art and Performance*, published by New York University Press. The selection committee said about McMillan's book, "A model for effective and probing interdisciplinary analysis, Embodied Avatars charts new terrain in gender and sexuality studies, visual culture studies, black cultural studies, and performance theory. What it ultimately teaches us is

how, under the most persistent and pervasive experiences of unfreedom, black women innovate artful practices of resistance, refusal, and radical self-possession."


Library & Media Center News:

Images in Blackness Film Series features screening and discussions by filmmakers and scholars whose work explores how diversity affects the entertainment industry. Throughout this series participants examine the intersection between race, gender, and sexuality and its role in determining acceptance, critical consideration, and commercial success in the entertainment industry.

The Bunche Center's Library and Media Center (LMC) has over 8,000 monograph, serial, archival and audio visual materials focusing on African, African American, and Caribbean history and culture. The book collection is supplemented with subscriptions to academic journals, popular magazines, and African American newspapers. The audio/ visual collection consists of popular and classic movies, documentaries, campus events, and music on audiocassette tapes, VHS tapes and DVD media. Archives collections in the LMC include vertical files, personal papers, and records created by local groups.

In 1968, UCLA students championed a proposal to create a Center for Afro-American History and Culture on the largely white, Westwood campus. "From the very beginning of American history," the proposal began, "Afro-Americans have formed an economically, socially, and culturally significant part of America. Despite the obvious importance of Afro-Americans," the proposal continued, "neither the public at large nor scholars know very much about the precise role of Afro-Americans in American life, past and present. The long overdue recognition of this omission and the importance of correcting it has led to this proposal for the study of Afro-American history and
