





UCLA faculty members discuss silent race films at L.A. museum

"Stunt Coordinator Says Deadpool 2 Death Was Avoidable"

Crewmembers on the set of *Deadpool 2* believe that the death of stuntwoman, Joi "SJ" Harris, was avoidable. The producers of the film wanted an African-American woman as the stunt person to more closely resemble the same sex and ethnicity of actress, Zazie Beetz, who plays Domino in the film. Joi Harris was primarily a road racer and had never previously performed motorcycle stunts on film.

UCLA Social Sciences Dean, Darnell Hunt, said, "If the movie's producers had to go outside of the normal stunt community to find someone who was both qualified and resembles the actress, that speaks to a problem of lack of diversity of stunt performers."
